The Pope's Intentions for December 2023: For Persons with Disabilities- "We pray that people living with disabilities may be at the centre of attention in society, and that institutions may offer inclusive programmes which value their active participation."

Advent: The First Sunday of Advent is the beginning of the Church's New Year. With it comes a change in the cycle of readings for both Sundays and weekdays. Sunday readings are from Cycle B (the year of Mark) and weekday readings are Year 2.

Advent is a time of waiting, conversion and hope. Waiting has two forms – the first one is in memory of the first coming of the Lord in our mortal flesh and the second is in prayer for his final, glorious coming as Lord of History and Universal Judge

Conversion, to which the liturgy of this time often refers quoting the prophets, especially John the Baptist, 'Repent for the kingdom of heaven is at hand' (Matthew 3:2)

Hope is a joyful hope that the salvation already accomplished by Christ (cf. Romans 8: 24-25) and the reality of grace in the world will mature and reach their fullness, thereby granting us what is promised by faith, and 'we shall become like him for we shall see him as he really is' (John 3:2)

<u>Lectio Divina</u>: Lectio Divina, translated as Divine reading continues this Wednesday night, 6th of December at 7.30pm in the parish office.

<u>Feast Days</u>: Monday 4th, St. John Damascene, priest and doctor of the Church, 675-749, was a Syrian Christian theologian. He became a priest in the monastery of St. Sabas near Jerusalem and was a leading figure in the defence of icons in the iconoclastic controversy. Wednesday 6th, St. Nicholas, is a fourth-century bishop of Myra in modern-day Turkey of whom little is known. Tradition gives him a reputation of great generosity. He is patron of Russia, sailors, pawnbrokers and of children.

Thursday 7th, St. Ambrose, bishop and doctor of the Church, 339-397, became governor of the Roman province whose seat was in Milan. In 374, the laity insisted on his becoming bishop though he was still not baptised. He defended orthodoxy in brilliant preaching and through his writing. Patron of Milan, beekeepers and domestic animals.

Saturday 9th, St. Juan Diego, 1474-1548. Saw the vision of Our Lady of Guadalupe in December 1531.

COP28 - UN Climate Conference in Dubal, November 30th to December 12th:

From the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference website: On behalf of the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference Laudato Si' Working Group (LSWG), Bishop Martin Hayes has written to Minister Eamon Ryan, Minister for the Environment, Climate, Communications and Transport, as well as to all frontbench environmental spokespersons of political parties North and South, seeking an urgent meeting with regard to Ireland's commitments for COP28, the UN Climate Conference which will take place in Dubai from 30 November to 12 December.

In his correspondence to politicians, Bishop Hayes has enclosed a copy of Pope Francis' recent publication that focuses on the climate crisis facing humanity, Laudate Deum. In an open letter, on behalf of the LSWG, Bishop Hayes stated, "In his 2015 ground-breaking encyclical letter on care for creation Laudato Si', Pope Francis placed emphasis on our interconnectedness as human beings with our natural world. On 4 October last, the Feast of the patron of the environment, Saint Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis issued a supplementary document, Laudate Deum, 'to clarify and complete' Laudato Si' (LD, 4). In Laudate Deum, the Holy Father highlights the consequences of ignoring that interconnectedness, ie. in seeing ourselves as separate from our natural world. In view of the ever-increasing global emissions — now comprehensively linked to the recent environmental disasters around our world and their impact upon the poorest and most vulnerable — the Pope calls us to act urgently, for 'the world in which we live is collapsing and may be nearing the breaking point' (LD, 2)." Will continue with this next week as the Conference approaches its end.
