<u>Learn more about St. Paul</u>: Monsignor Goold will give two talks on St Paul as follows: Wednesday 6th and Wednesday 13th March at the MyPlace centre, 8pm. Many of our readings at Mass come from the letters of St Paul to various communities. Come along and learn a bit more about St. Paul and his importance to Christianity.

<u>Feast Days</u>: Monday, March 4th, St. Casimir, 1458-1484, strove to promote peace and the unity of Western Europe. Though a young prince, he chose a life of prayer and penance. Patron saint of Poland.

Tuesday, March 5th, St. Kieran, was born in Cape Clear, Co. Cork. He is numbered among the pre-Patrician saints of Ireland. He went to the Continent, where he was baptised and later ordained priest and bishop. He returned to his father's territory, Ossory, where he lived as a hermit. Disciples soon joined him and Saigir became a well-known monastery.

Thursday, March 7th, St. Perpetua, a young upper-class married woman, and St. Felicity, a slave girl, were martyred in Carthage, 203 AD

Friday, March 8th, St. John of God, 1495-1550, devoted his life to the care of the poor and the sick. He is patron of nurses, the sick, heart patients, printers and booksellers.

Saturday, March 9th, St. Frances of Rome, died 1440, lived a happily married life and founded a society of women with the Rule of St. Benedict and became a member of it after her husband's death.

For a good number of years now, the 8th March has been designated as International Women's Day. Let us pray on this day for all women, remembering especially those who are suffering in any particular way, may the Lord, through the intercession of Our Lady, pour out his grace on all women this day.

We pray as well for our country at this time of decision as people turn out to vote on the referenda on Friday.

Quote for the Week: "In contemporary society there now exists a welcome co-responsibility between women and men for every aspect of domestic life, including the provision of care in the home. We believe that, rather than removing the present acknowledgement of the role of women and the place of the home, it would be preferable and consistent with contemporary social values that the State would recognise the provision of care by women and men alike."
