<u>Quote for the Week</u>: "If my daughter can forgive him who am I to withhold forgiveness" - Assunta Goretti (nee Carlini), St. Maria Goretti's mother <u>Feast Days</u>: Monday, 1<sup>st</sup> July, *St. Oliver Plunkett*, from Irish nobility, whose family supported King Charles I. ordained in Rome in 1654, he was a professor of theology from then until appointed Archbishop of Armagh in 1669. He ministered in Armagh, though forced to work in a covert way during the suppression of priests. He was arrested and tried at Dundalk in 1679 for conspiring against the state. He was moved to Newgate Prison, London. He was found guilty of high treason 'for promoting the Catholic faith', and was condemned to a gruesome death. He was hanged, drawn and quartered on the 1<sup>st</sup> July 1681 at Tyburn, in London. He was the last Catholic to die for his faith at Tyburn, and the first of the Irish martyrs to be beatified in 1920. He was canonised by Pope Paul VI on the 12<sup>th</sup> October 1975. He is buried at Downside Abbey, England; his head is venerated in St. Peter's Church, Drogheda.

Wednesday, 3<sup>rd</sup> July, *St. Thomas*, Apostle, is said to have preached the gospel in India where ihe was martyred. The faith that led him to know Christ in his wounds also sent him to the farthest places to preach Christ.

Thursday, 4<sup>th</sup> July, *St. Elizabeth of Portugal*, 1271-1336, of the House of Aragon, had an unhappy marriage with the King of Portugal. She persevered in prayer and good works, and as a widow lived in poverty as a Franciscan tertiary.

Saturday, 6th July, St. Maria Goretti, 1890-1902, stabbed to death in defence of her virtue.

<u>Holiness</u>: "History is full of examples of men and women who have become all they were created to be – we call them saints. Some of them were priests, monks or nuns. Some were married and others were single. Some were rich, some were poor. Some were educated; others were uneducated. Some were young and some were old. Holiness is for everyone – no exceptions. Holiness is for you. Every day God invites you to be all he created you to be.

Many people falsely believe that if you want to be holy, you are not allowed to enjoy life. Some believe to be holy you have to run away from the world. Others think you have to be in church on your knees praying all day. Still others believe to be holy you have to walk around with a halo, that you're not allowed to smile, or have fun, or enjoy yourself at all. They think to be holy you have to despise everything of this world and walk around with a long, drawn-out, stoic look on your face.

These are all the very unnatural and unattractive ideas that the world proclaims about holiness. The world ridicules holiness."
